**RE: Ministry of the Attorney General and Justice Canada
Prosecution Pilot for First Nation laws 2024-2025**

The Ministry of the Attorney General and Justice Canada are working together to support the prosecution of First Nations laws and by-laws.

As you may know, in December 2022, the Ministry of the Attorney General and Justice Canada launched a Prosecution Pilot program to support First Nations to retain private counsel to prosecute offences under First Nations laws and by-laws. The Prosecution Pilot aimed to improve community safety and well-being through deterrence and appropriate legal consequences, including prosecutions before the Ontario Court of Justice or the diversion of appropriate matters into restorative justice programs or community courts (e.g., the Akwesasne Court). Eleven First Nations in Ontario participated in the Prosecution Pilot, which was scheduled to conclude on **March 31, 2024**.

I am pleased to advise that Ontario and Canada will extend the Prosecution Pilot until **March 31, 2025**. This one-year extension is intended to provide opportunities for more First Nations to participate in the program. We anticipate the additional time and refinements will also allow us to build on the successes and lessons learned to help inform longer term solutions.

The extended Prosecution Pilot will continue to be application-based and open to all First Nations in Ontario, subject to the availability of funding. Applications will be accepted by the Ministry of the Attorney General (Indigenous Justice Division) and Justice Canada until December 31st, 2024. First Nations will be asked to include the following information in their application:

1. A copy of at least one First Nation law for review and/or prosecution through the Prosecution Pilot.
2. The proposed enforcement service or mechanism to enforce the First Nation law(s) included in the Pilot (e.g., by-law officers, local police service).
3. A description of the activities to be undertaken with funding under the Prosecution Pilot.
4. A budget proposal.

Successful applicants will each receive up to \$35,000 to retain private counsel to support the review and prosecution of the First Nation laws identified in the application. Where a First Nation has identified OPP as the proposed enforcement service for the purpose of the Prosecution Pilot in their application, the appropriate detachment will be notified. To promote the early identification and resolution of potential operational challenges on the ground, the Ministry of the Attorney General and Justice Canada will offer to facilitate one or more meetings with the relevant local justice system partners (e.g., by-law officers where applicable, police services, court services, Crown Attorneys who will be getting notice of the private prosecutions pursuant to section 507.1(3) of the Code). For more information, see enclosed application materials.

We are sharing this information with you as participating communities may seek police enforcement of First Nation laws as part of the Prosecution Pilot. As you know, under the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019*, police officers are not required to enforce First Nation laws, but they are also not prohibited from doing so, and maintain their authority to enforce First Nations by-laws as long as they comply with other legal obligations and restrictions in doing so (e.g., restrictions on use of force under the *Charter* and *Criminal Code*).

I am requesting your assistance to provide this update to Chiefs of Police throughout Ontario with the goal of increasing awareness of the Prosecutions Pilot. We hope that the Prosecution Pilot will help to enhance First Nations' access to prosecution services and support police in their work to advance key Indigenous policing and community safety priorities.

RECIPIENT OBLIGATIONS

Successful applicants will be required to:

- Sign a Transfer Payment Agreement with Ontario (Ministry of the Attorney General, Indigenous Justice Division) outlining the terms and conditions for receiving funds;
- Carry at least \$2 million commercial general liability insurance coverage, and add “His Majesty the King in Right of Ontario as represented by the Attorney General” as a co-insured on this coverage before the Transfer Payment Agreement can be executed;
- Report back to IJD within the specified timeframes as outlined in the Transfer Payment Agreement in the form specified by the ministry;
- Allow IJD to verify and/or audit the information submitted (at the discretion of the ministry) to ensure that the information is complete and accurate, and that the funds were used for the intended purpose(s);
- Agree that if the funds were not or will not be used for the intended purpose(s), because specified activities were not completed, that IJD has the right at a future date to recover the funds that were transferred to the recipient;
- Advise IJD of any new First Nations to be included in the Pilot after funding has been approved; and
- Obtain IJD’s prior approval for any proposed change to the project after funding has been approved.

DISCLAIMER

The provision of funding under the Prosecution Pilot is not an acknowledgement by the Government of Ontario of the validity or enforceability of any First Nation law or recognition of an inherent law, inherent right or an Aboriginal or treaty right pursuant to s. 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982*. For greater certainty, the Government of Ontario respects the authority of the Ontario Court of Justice to determine which matters it can adjudicate.

Funding is dependent on the availability of funds. IJD and Justice Canada reserve the right, at their discretion, to fund or not fund any particular project that has been applied for. Applicants should be aware that meeting the eligibility criteria as outlined in the 2024-2025 Prosecution Pilot Funding Guidelines does not guarantee funding or a particular funding amount. Funds received may only be spent on eligible activities carried out during the funding year specified in the budget that will be attached to the Agreement.

PROSECUTION PILOT FUNDING GUIDELINES

BACKGROUND

In December 2022, the Ontario Ministry of the Attorney General (MAG) and Justice Canada jointly launched a Prosecution Pilot, which provided one-time funding to interested First Nations to support their retention of private legal counsel to review their laws and prosecute infractions, where appropriate.

The Prosecution Pilot has now been extended to **March 31, 2025**.

The extended Prosecution Pilot is intended to provide opportunity for additional First Nations to identify laws they are seeking to enforce based on community needs and priorities. It will also enable participating First Nations to undertake a legal review of these laws to support more effective enforcement and prosecution.

The Prosecution Pilot is application-based and open to all First Nations within Ontario, subject to the availability of funding. Applications will be accepted by the Indigenous Justice Division (IJD) of MAG and Justice Canada until **December 31st, 2024**.

To promote the early identification and resolution of potential operational challenges on the ground, IJD and Justice Canada are offering to facilitate one or more meetings with the relevant local justice system partners (e.g., by-law officers where applicable, police services, court services, Crown Attorney).

FUNDING AMOUNTS

Successful applicants will each receive up to \$35,000 to retain private counsel to support the review and prosecution of the First Nation laws identified in the application.

The amount of funding available for an individual First Nation is capped at \$35,000. If/when a First Nation is approved for this funding, it will be flowed to the community by IJD on behalf of Ontario and Canada through a Transfer Payment Agreement. Funding must be spent in full by **March 31, 2025**.

ELIGIBILITY

Funding is available to First Nation communities in Ontario that:

- have one or more duly enacted First Nation laws. These laws may be enacted pursuant to jurisdiction recognized in federal statute (e.g., Indian Act by-laws, land code laws), and/or pursuant to the First Nation's inherent jurisdiction; and,
 - are seeking to undertake a legal review of those laws to support enforceability; and/or
 - are seeking to prosecute offences under those laws at the Ontario Court of Justice by way of summary conviction procedure or divert or refer

matters related to offences under those laws to a community/restorative justice process.

Individual First Nations in Ontario are eligible to apply for funding as well as First Nation organizations applying on behalf of one or more First Nations in Ontario (i.e., Tribal Councils, Provincial-Territorial Organizations). An organization applying on behalf of one or more First Nations must provide a Band Council Resolution in support of the application from each community represented on the application.

Note: First Nations that received funding through the Prosecution Pilot in a previous year are eligible to re-apply in 2024-2025, however, priority will be given to new applicants.

ELIGIBLE PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND COSTS

Prosecution Pilot funding may be used to support the review of laws duly enacted by a First Nation pursuant to jurisdiction recognized by federal statute and/or the First Nation's inherent jurisdiction, and which include at least one offence the First Nation is seeking to enforce and prosecute.

Prosecution Pilot funding may also be used to support prosecutions where proceedings are commenced by way of summary conviction procedure at the Ontario Court of Justice. First Nations may also use Pilot funding to divert or resolve the matter through a restorative justice program or prosecute the matter in the community's own court (e.g., the Akwesasne Court).

Eligible activities and project costs:

- Retaining legal counsel to:
 - Undertake a legal review of a First Nation's existing law(s);
 - Prosecute offences under a First Nation's existing law(s) at the Ontario Court of Justice by way of summary conviction procedure; and/or
 - Divert or refer offences under a First Nation's existing law(s) to a community/restorative justice process.

Activities and project costs that are not eligible for funding:

- Development/enactment of new** First Nation laws.
- Administrative costs exceeding 10% of the overall project costs.
- Project components already completed or fully funded through other sources.

** Note: Funding for the development of new First Nation laws may be available through Indigenous Services Canada's [Professional and Institutional Development Program](#).

APPLICATION PROCESS AND TIMELINES

- Applications will be accepted until **December 31, 2024**.
- The receipt of applications will be acknowledged electronically. Although IJD and Justice Canada will endeavour review applications expeditiously, applications may take approximately four weeks to process.

First Nations applying for funding under the Prosecution Pilot must include the following information in their application:

- A copy of any duly enacted First Nation law(s) the First Nation is seeking to include in the Pilot.
- The proposed enforcement service or mechanism to enforce the First Nation law(s) included in the Pilot (e.g., by-law officers, local police service).
- A description of the activities to be undertaken with funding under the Pilot.
- A budget proposal.

Before submitting your application, please ensure that you :

- Review the Prosecution Pilot Funding Guidelines in its entirety;
- Complete the entire application form and submit the required supporting information where applicable.

RECIPIENT OBLIGATIONS

Successful applicants will be required to:

- Sign a Transfer Payment Agreement with Ontario (Ministry of the Attorney General, Indigenous Justice Division) outlining the terms and conditions for receiving funds;
- Carry at least \$2 million commercial general liability insurance coverage, and add "His Majesty the King in Right of Ontario as represented by the Attorney General" as a co-insured on this coverage before the Transfer Payment Agreement can be executed;
- Report back to IJD within the specified timeframes as outlined in the Transfer Payment Agreement in the form specified by the ministry;
- Allow IJD to verify and/or audit the information submitted (at the discretion of the ministry) to ensure that the information is complete and accurate, and that the funds were used for the intended purpose(s);
- Agree that if the funds were not or will not be used for the intended purpose(s), because specified activities were not completed, that IJD has the right at a future date to recover the funds that were transferred to the recipient;
- Advise IJD of any additional First Nation laws to be included in the Pilot after funding has been approved; and
- Obtain IJD's prior approval for any proposed change to the project after funding has been approved.

DISCLAIMER

The provision of funding under the Prosecution Pilot is not an acknowledgement by the Government of Ontario of the validity or enforceability of any First Nation law or recognition of an inherent law, inherent right or an Aboriginal or treaty right pursuant to s. 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982*. For greater certainty, the Government of Ontario respects the authority of the Ontario Court of Justice to determine which matters it can adjudicate.

Funding is dependent on the availability of funds. IJD and Justice Canada reserve the right, at their discretion, to fund or not fund any particular project for which an application has been submitted. Applicants should be aware that meeting the eligibility criteria as outlined above does not guarantee funding or a particular funding amount. Funds received may only be spent on eligible activities carried out during the funding year specified in the budget that will be attached to the Agreement.

COLLECTION AND SHARING OF INFORMATION

IJD is subject to the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA)*. This memorandum is to provide an update on the education and awareness period of the *Towing and Storage Safety and Enforcement Act* (TSSEA) and to advise of an amendment to Ontario Regulation 162/23 – Charges for Towing and Vehicle Storage Services.

As per the March 28, 2024, All Chiefs Memo, the ministry implemented an extended education and awareness period to support the industry in adjusting to the new legislation. This extension will end on July 1st, 2024. The ministry thanks our police partners for their cooperation and efforts to educate the sector during the transition period.

Also, effective July 1, 2024, all tow truck drivers must have a TSSEA certificate to operate in Ontario.

The ministry is also advising of a recent amendment to Ontario Regulation 162/23, which allows for tow operators to charge for clean-up services within the Maximum Rate Schedule under basic towing services. This regulatory amendment took effect on June 14, 2024.

A full review of the Maximum Rate Schedule is underway and once the review is complete, the ministry will consult with industry prior to implementing further amendments.

SUBJECT: **Provincial Bail Compliance Dashboard –
Security Access Requirements**

I am writing to request the dissemination of an All Chiefs Memo to Ontario Chiefs of Police, to apprise our policing partners of the security requirements to access the Provincial Bail Compliance Dashboard (BCD). This technology solution is currently under development within the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), in collaboration with the Toronto Police Service and other Ontario justice sector partners, with a phased launch scheduled to commence in summer 2024.

Due to the highly sensitive nature of the data contained in this OPP-hosted dashboard application, the following security provisions will apply for onboarding and accessing the Provincial BCD:

- All agencies wishing to be onboarded and access the Provincial BCD must have a valid National Police Services Network (NPSNet) Connection Authorization Change Request (NCACR) with the Ontario Police Technology Information Cooperative (OPTIC), the Emergency Services Cooperative Ontario (ESCO) group, or the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), as applicable.
- Any agency whose NCACR is expiring within six (6) months will be required to provide written confirmation that preparations for their NCACR renewal are underway, and that they will remain in compliance with the access requirements by maintaining a valid NCACR.

Efforts will be made at the program level to work with any agency that does not meet the security requirements, to support compliance. If an agency's compliance lapses, the matter will be referred to an executive steering committee for further action, which may include denying, revoking or restricting access to the Provincial BCD where necessary to ensure the security of law enforcement data.

SUBJECT: Automatic Vehicle Permit (Licence Plate) Validation

This memorandum is to advise the policing community of recent amendments to the *Highway Traffic Act* (HTA) that will come into force on July 1, 2024.

On May 16, 2024, the *Get It Done Act, 2024* (formerly Bill 162) received Royal Assent. Among the various changes, it enables the government to automatically renew licence plates for most passenger vehicles, light duty commercial vehicles ($\leq 3000\text{kg}$), motorcycles, limited speed motorcycles, and mopeds (in-scope vehicles). Only vehicles registered to individuals (or jointly between two individuals) are eligible at this time. Vehicles registered to companies are not in scope.

Effective July 1, 2024, when a licence plate expiry date approaches, the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) will attempt to renew these plates automatically. If an eligible in-scope vehicle is insured and has no defaulted fines or tolls, its plates will be automatically renewed for one year. If the plates of an eligible vehicle cannot be renewed due to a fine, toll, or insurance issue, the vehicle owner will be notified by paper or digital notification of the issue and steps they need to take to renew their plate. Expired plates will be subject to roadside enforcement and vehicle owners must continue to update address changes within six (6) days of moving.

Please note, starting on July 1, 2024, the Ministry of Transportation will also make a one-time attempt to renew all eligible plates that have expired since January 2020. For plates that cannot be renewed due to fines, tolls or insurance issues, vehicle owners who have not provided digital contact information will receive a paper notice sent to the last address on record indicating the steps they need to take to renew.

Vehicle owners who pay their defaulted fines on or near their expiry date may still appear on the hotlist because of delays in updating MTO's system. To ensure vehicle owners are not incorrectly flagged due to system update delays, there will be a delay flagging expired plates to the Automated Licence Plate Reader (ALPR) Hotlist, until seven (7) calendar days has elapsed from the time of expiry. All other ALPR hotlist data will remain the same.

Since the program will ensure that no in-scope vehicle owner has their plate expire simply because they forgot to renew, we expect to see a decrease in the number of expired plates for eligible vehicles on the road.

I also want to acknowledge the sustained efforts of our policing partners as they continue to take a measured, risk-based approach to roadside enforcement.

Public education and awareness are critical to ensuring successful implementation as we modernize vehicle registration and related processes. As a key partner, police services will continue to be engaged appropriately to ensure operational alignment of new programs or other changes and to support effective roadside interaction.

BACKGROUND:

On February 22, 2022, the government announced it was making life more affordable and convenient for nearly eight million vehicle owners by eliminating licence plate renewal fees and the requirement to have a licence plate sticker for passenger vehicles, light-duty trucks, motorcycles and mopeds, effective March 13, 2022. In addition, the government indicated that vehicle owners will still be required to renew their licence plate every one or two years at no cost.

Background

Section 31 (1)(j) of the *Police Services Act* requires the Board to “review the chief of police’s administration of the complaints system under Part V and receive regular reports from the chief of police on his or her administration of the complaints system.” This Report is submitted in accordance with the *Act*.

Summary

There were 29 complaints received in Q1 of 2024, a decrease of 5 from the same period last year. The complaints are categorized into the following types:

Public complaints include all OIPRD complaints and any that the public brings forward to the Service against Peterborough Police Service members.

Internal complaints are matters that are driven from internal processes which are known as Chief's Complaints. These are documented by supervisors and are dealt with under the *Police Service Act (PSA)*.

Local complaints are less serious and informal matters that citizens raise against officers/civilian members or procedures of the Service. These are raised to make the Service aware but are not official complaints.

Of the nine Public Complaints in Q1 2024, the status is as follows:

- 5 complaints were screened out and not accepted by the OIPRD.
- 1 complaint was withdrawn by the Complainant.
- 1 complaint was resolved by informal resolution.
- 2 complaints were investigated and found to be unsubstantiated.

The one Internal Complaint in Q1 2024 was investigated and found to be substantiated.

The following is an update from the Q4 2023 complaints summary:

- There were two active public complaints from Q4 2023, investigated by the Professional Standards Unit. One of the matters was found to be unsubstantiated and closed while the other was substantiated, dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the *Police Services Act* and internal Procedure, and is now closed.
- The one active internal complaint from Q4 2023, investigated by the Professional Standards Unit was found to be unsubstantiated and closed.
- The one active internal complaint from Q2 2023, is still open but under a Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) delay.

This Report has been prepared to inform the Board of the first quarter of 2024 Occurrence Stats – All Violations, which includes all criminal offences and non-criminal offence calls in which Peterborough Police Service responded.

Work Load

In the first quarter of 2024, Peterborough experienced a total of 1,726 reported criminal offence-related calls for service, reflecting a 6.6% increase compared to the 1,619 criminal offence-related calls reported during the same period in 2023.

There were 8,143 non-criminal offence calls in the first quarter of 2024, marking a 6.4% increase from the 7,650 non-offence calls reported during the same period in 2023.

The total number of criminal offence and non-criminal offence calls for service in the City of Peterborough, during the first quarter of 2024, reached 9,869, representing a 6.5% increase from the 9,269 calls recorded in the same period of 2023.

Community Services

The Community Services Unit has dedicated officers assigned to Peterborough schools, where they collaborate with staff to create and maintain a supportive learning environment that is safe and accepting for all students and staff. Their efforts aim to foster a positive school climate and address any issues that may arise, ensuring the well-being and security of the entire school community.

During the first quarter of 2024, Community Services Officers conducted 168 visits to Peterborough schools and facilitated 50 lockdown drills.

Traffic Safety

In the first quarter of 2024, a total of 1,564 Provincial Offence Notices (PONs) were issued. Contributing to this total was the Traffic Unit's effort, which included conducting 63 traffic details in Peterborough.

Five-year Provincial Offence Notices summary:

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 617 reported motor vehicle collisions, marking a 15.3% increase from the 544 collisions reported during the same period in 2023.

In the first quarter of 2024, five R.I.D.E. (Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere) details were conducted in Peterborough, during which 2,012 vehicles were checked. Expanding to include Peterborough, Cavan Monaghan, and Lakefield, a total of 2,276 vehicles were checked.

Subject: Q1 Policing Activity Report – Cavan Monaghan Township

Purpose

This report is prepared to inform the Board and Mayor Matthew Graham and members of Cavan Monaghan Council of the policing activities in the Township of Cavan Monaghan for the first quarter of 2024.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board receive this Report for their information, and the contents be distributed to Mayor Graham.

Work Rate

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 43 criminal offence-related occurrences reported in the Township of Cavan Monaghan, an increase from the 35 criminal offence-related calls reported during the same period in 2023.

This breakdown highlights the 43 various criminal offences. These incidents included:

- 6 thefts
- 6 theft of motor vehicles
- 6 frauds
- 5 residential/business break and enters
- 4 criminal harassments
- 3 sex offences
- 3 assaults
- 3 uttering threats
- 3 mischiefs

- 2 impaired and/or refuse demand
- 1 bail violations
- 1 unnecessary suffering to animals

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 410 non-criminal offence calls for service, representing a very small increase from the 403 reported during the same period in 2023.

The overall clearance is 42% in the first quarter, which is virtually unchanged from the same period in 2023.

Specialty Unit Requirements

There were no incidents in the first quarter of 2024 that required a Specialty Unit response from the Ontario Provincial Police or Durham Regional Police.

Specialty Unit responses are those that exceed the capabilities of the Peterborough Police Service, e.g. Hostage Rescue Unit.

Community Services

The Community Services Unit has dedicated officers assigned to the Township’s schools, tasked with the essential mission of supporting staff in fostering a safe and inclusive learning environment for all students and faculty members.

During the first quarter of 2024, school officers conducted a total of 12 school visits across both elementary schools and one high school. Three lockdown drills were successfully completed.

Traffic Enforcement

In Cavan Monaghan during the first quarter, two R.I.D.E. details were conducted, resulting in 164 vehicles being checked for impaired driving. Additionally, the Traffic Unit conducted six enforcement initiatives within the same quarter. These initiatives represent proactive measures taken above and beyond the regular duties of officers assigned to patrol Cavan Monaghan Township.

In the first quarter of 2024, there were a total of 266 Provincial Offence Notices (PONs) issued, down from 348 Provincial Offence Notices issued during the same period in 2023.

Collisions

There were 23 collisions reported in the first quarter of 2024, compared to 27, during the same period in 2023.

Overtime

Overtime and statutory holiday hours related to activities in the Township for the first quarter of 2024 amounts to an approximate cost of \$4,273.33 an increase from \$2,259.11 in 2023.

Summary

The clearance rate of all offences in the first quarter of 2024 was 42%, while the clearance rate in 2023, for the first quarter, was 41.9 %.

Subject: Q1 Policing Activity Report – Ward of Lakefield

Purpose

This Report is prepared to inform the Board, as well as Mayor Sherry Senis and members of Selwyn Council of the policing activities in the Ward of Lakefield during the first quarter of 2024.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board receive this Report for their information, and the contents be distributed to Mayor Senis.

Workload

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 17 criminal offence-related occurrences reported, a decrease of 46.9% from the 32 criminal offence-related calls recorded during the same period in 2023.

In the first quarter of 2024, the 17 criminal offence-related occurrences included:

- 5 theft under \$5000
- 3 fraud over \$5000
- 2 utter threats
- 2 bail violations
- 1 assault with a weapon
- 1 assault
- 1 criminal harassment
- 1 fraud over \$5000
- 1 mischief

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 161 non-criminal offence calls for service, representing a 22% increase from the 132 calls reported during the same period in 2023.

The overall clearance is 28.15% in the first quarter, which is virtually unchanged from the same period in 2023.

Specialty Unit Requirements

There were no incidents in the first quarter of 2024 that required a Specialty Unit response from the Ontario Provincial Police or Durham Regional Police.

Specialty Unit responses are those that exceed the capabilities of the Peterborough Police Service, e.g. Hostage Rescue Unit.

Community Services

The Community Services Unit has an officer assigned to the Lakefield schools, with the focus of assisting staff in creating a learning environment that is safe and accepting for all students and staff.

During the first quarter of 2024, the Community Services Officers conducted one lockdown drill and completed seven school visits.

Traffic Enforcement

In the first quarter of 2024, the Traffic Unit conducted three traffic enforcement details, which resulted in 66 Provincial Offence Notices. Traffic details will continue throughout the year as well as other targeted enforcement initiatives by both the Traffic Unit and officers assigned to police Lakefield. Speeding will continue to be monitored in areas identified and will be supported by speed measuring data collection.

Collisions

In the first quarter of 2024, there were 12 reported collisions, compared to the seven collisions recorded in the same period in 2023.

These collisions can be attributed to road conditions and human error (careless driving, distracted driving, and other *Highway Traffic Act* infractions).

Overtime

In the first quarter of 2024, the cost associated with overtime for investigations and statutory holiday pay was \$2,109.41.

Background

There was an increase in reported violations during Quarter One (Q1) of 2024, compared to the same period in 2023. Reported violent crimes increased from 277 offences in 2023 to 316 offences in 2024, representing a 14.1% increase.

The reported offences captured in the tables below are a snapshot of categories of interest. The clearance rates do not necessarily reflect the clearance of crimes committed during Q1; they can reflect the clearance of crimes committed in previous quarters.

VIOLENT CRIMES AGAINST PERSON:

Homicides:

Homicides include the following classifications: murder in the first and second degree, attempt murders, manslaughter, and criminal negligence causing death.

There were 2 violations under the category of homicide in the Q1 of 2024, and 2 violations cleared by charge. Both of these incidents were attempt murders. From Q1 of 2023 to Q1 of 2024 there was a 200% increase in this category. The Q1 clearance rate for 2024 was 100%.

While this report does not capture every category of offences reported to police, it does capture offences that include crimes against person, both violent and non-violent, drug offences, and criminal traffic related offences.

Bail violations have been included in this report as it prudent to begin tracking offenders out of custody on a form of release that are reoffending. Bail violations have become a topic of concern amongst police and community. Both violent and non-violent offenders are regularly being released back to the community where the cycle of offending continues. We have seen instances of violence and even loss of life as a result.

Purpose

The *Community Safety and Policing Act*, the Service's Procedure and the Board's policy, LE-020 Collection, Preservation and Control of Evidence and Property, each contain a provision requiring an annual audit of the Seized Property and Evidence Management Unit. This report outlines the details of the audit that was completed this year.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board receive this report for their information.

Background

Excerpts from LE-020:

Service Procedure:

- 24.2 An independent audit shall be conducted of the evidence and property rooms on an annual basis. This audit shall be conducted by the Policy, Audit and Risk Manager, or another Member of the Service as designated by the Chief, who is not directly connected with the control of property and evidence.

Board Policy:

- 1.1 It is the policy of the Peterborough Police Service Board with respect to property and evidence control and the collection, preservation, documentation and analysis of physical evidence that the Chief of Police will:
- d) ensure that an annual audit of all property/evidence held by the police service is conducted by a member(s) not routinely or directly connected with the property/evidence control function, and report the results to the Board

There is one full time Property and Evidence Coordinator in this Unit and a part time Coordinator who is currently assisting three full days and two half days per week while also working in court as a Special Constable.

This part time position is expected to transition to full time in the near future. This Unit is overseen by the Inspector in Charge of Support Services.

A full inventory was completed in the spring of 2023, by a Supervisor. At that time, there were 6,699 items in the Service's possession, all of which were accounted for. The results were reported to the Chief and Board in August of last year.

The 2024 audit commenced on May 28th and concluded on May 30th. Both Coordinators assisted the Manager. In total, there were 7,712 items in the seized property and evidence management Unit. This represents an increase of 1,013 or 15% from 2023.

The number of items represent what was in the Service's possession the day the audit commenced. These numbers fluctuate daily depending on what comes into possession of the Service and what is disposed of.

The sample size is based on best practices and information from the RCMP. It represents the number of items that were randomly selected from each area.

All items were accounted for. There were only three instances of human error; twice, an item was placed on the wrong shelf or location and one incident where the item was

picked up by the owner, but the property tag wasn't returned to the Unit. These were quickly rectified.

Firearms:

Firearms were not included in this audit as a complete inventory of the firearms room was conducted in February by the Seized Property and Evidence Management Coordinator and the Manager of Strategic Risk Management Services.

This audit is an annual requirement from the Ministry of the Solicitor General and the results were reported to Chief Betts, Deputy Chief Hartnett and the Ministry. There were 159 firearms and other weapons that had come into possession of the Service or were disposed of in 2023. All firearms were accounted for during that audit.

Summary

There were no concerns observed during this audit. All items were located and in order. Given the physical storage limitations, the property room and evidence are well organized; however, it is evident that a lack of storage and workspace is an issue, which is a concern for the Service.

Summary

On December 26, 2023, the Special Investigations Unit (SIU) began an investigation relating to the death of a male following an interaction with members of the Peterborough Police Service. The death resulted in the SIU invoking its mandate and designating a Subject Official (SO).

On April 26, 2024, the SIU Director notified Chief Betts, in writing, that the investigation was complete, and no further action was being considered against the SO. In accordance with Section 32 of the Ontario Regulation 268/10, Chief Betts caused the matter to be investigated by the Professional Standards Unit. The investigation determined that there were minor breaches of organizational procedures in relation to this incident that have since been rectified.

Key Points:

- a. Subject Official identified.
- b. The SIU determined that there were no grounds to lay criminal charges against the Subject Official.
- c. The Professional Standards Unit identified minor breaches of organization procedures that have since been rectified.

Summary

On December 26, 2023, the SO was dispatched to an address in the Village of Lakefield in response to a suicidal male (affected person). The SO made verbal contact with the affected person and was subsequently struck in the face with a baseball bat. The SO retreated from the residence and awaited further officers to attend the scene.

While waiting for additional officers, the SO continued to verbally call out to the affected person and try to connect by phone call and text message. These efforts were completed with negative results.

When additional officers arrived on scene, the affected persons residence door was breached, and officers entered and located the affected person deceased as a result of suicide. Officers and paramedics who were on scene commenced CPR with negative results.

An autopsy was conducted on the affected person. Cause of death indicated as attributable to "hanging".

Legal - History:

Legal spending is difficult to predict and is responsible for the Board's deficits from 2013-2017 and again from 2021-2023. In some instances, they were absorbed by the Board's surplus in other accounts or by the Service's surplus. In other years, transfers were made from the legal reserve to cover the shortfall.

Legal has been the primary reason for the significant increase in the Board's budget in recent years. Over the past decade legal spending has increased steadily, due in large part to increased costs related to HR matters, disciplinary hearings, OIPRD directed hearings, mandated coroner's inquests and SIU matters.

In order to help safeguard against any future unknown legal costs, the Board will make a contribution to the Legal Fees reserve account once again in 2025 (there were no contributions made in 2022-2024).

Other Accounts:

Most other operating accounts remain unchanged from 2024, with the exception of an annual increase related to staff total compensation and a small increase related to annual membership costs.

Annual contributions to the Business/Strategic Plan and Recruitment/Consulting reserve accounts remain unchanged from 2024.

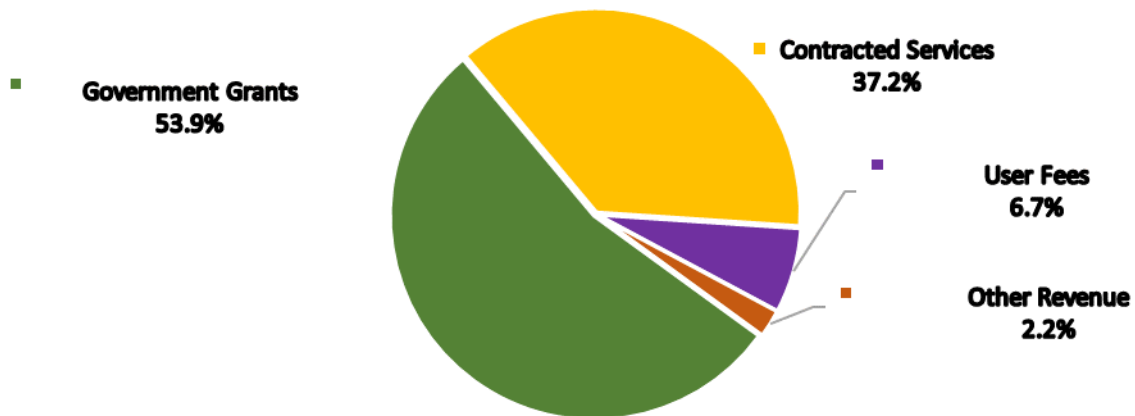
Background

Our first quarterly financial report shows a net disbursement of \$8,172,028, accounting for 23.3% of the fiscal budget. This year's percentage is slightly lower than the 24.7% recorded for the same period last year, mainly due to a timing factor.

The table and pie chart below provide information about sources of revenue received in the first quarter of 2024.

A total revenue of \$1,481,437 was generated in the reporting period. This revenue comprised provincial grants totaling \$798,410, contracted services with other municipalities amounting to \$550,655, license and user fees equaling \$99,795, and other revenues standing at \$32,577.

The favourable budget variance in total revenue is driven by several factors. The higher-than-budgeted fiscal allocation of \$78,097 for Court Security and Prisoner Transportation program and unexpected year-to-date funding of \$19,229 for NG-911 project have significantly contributed to this positive outcome. While the funding for NG-911 capital project will be absorbed by project-specific funding, the boost in revenue from higher user fees for records checks, totaling \$20,786, has further bolstered our financial performance.

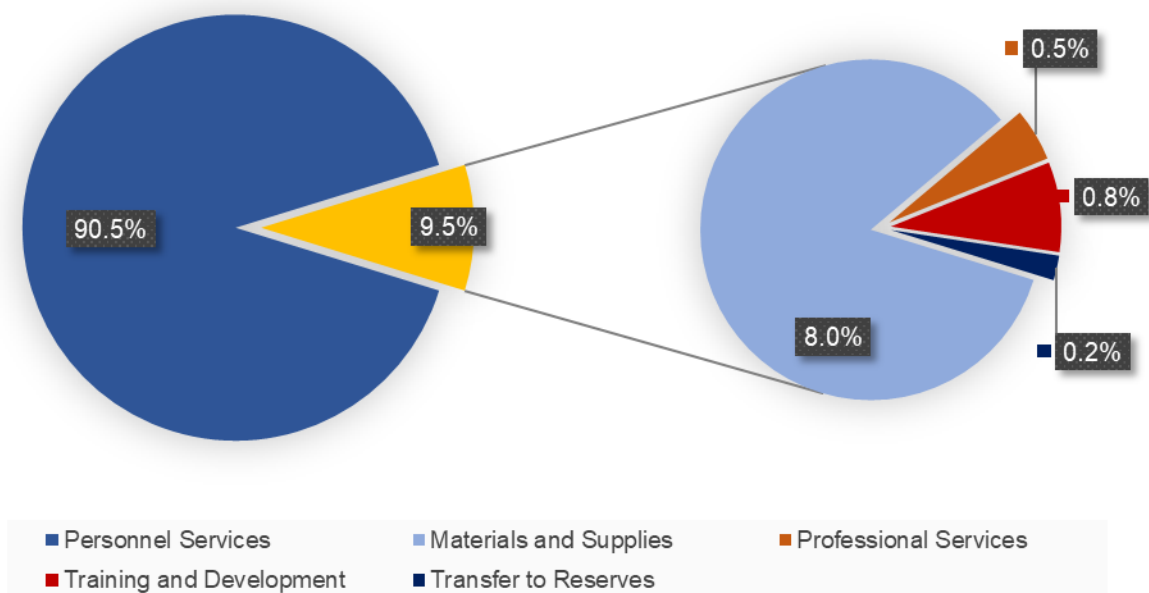
Total revenue recognized in this period includes unexpected income from taxi and limousine licenses. This revenue was not anticipated, as it was expected that the administration of these fees and licenses would transfer to the city effective January 1, 2024.

Fees and Charges totaled \$99,795, derived from the following services: Taxi / Limousine fees and licenses (\$4,790), Record Checks (\$83,286), Alarm Calls (\$3,140), MVC Reports (\$680), Towing fees (\$6,387), Confirmation Letters (\$330) and FOI Requests (\$1,182).

Quarter-to-date personnel costs amounted to \$8,741,762, representing 24% of the annual budget of \$36,372,606. This favourable variance is attributed to several factors:

1. Contractual salary increases for 2024 remain pending due to ongoing collective agreement negotiations during the quarter.
2. Savings were realized from two unfilled positions budgeted for 2023, and additional vacancies. However, these savings were partially offset by increased usage of part-time and contract employees, as well as higher-than-planned overtime expenses.
3. Some salary savings were also offset by higher-than-anticipated workers' compensation insurance costs.

Total non-personnel expenditures amounted to \$911,702, representing 22.2% of the annual budget.

Despite some anticipated increases in expenditures, such as employee benefits, there remain areas of financial risk for the remainder of the year that may not yet be apparent. Additionally, timing factors affect ongoing contractual services, including software licenses, technical support, consultant and legal costs, and training and development.

Given the current economic conditions and political uncertainties, we anticipate higher-than-normal inflation rates for fuel, material, and labour services will persist throughout the year.

Capital Expenditures Highlights

During the first quarter, \$95,042 was allocated to capital projects. Financing for the capital budget is partially supported by \$71,114 in revenue generated from the auction sale of police vehicles and a donation of computer equipment valued at \$7,802 from Fleming College. As of March 31, 2024, the vehicle purchases have not yet arrived. Additionally, in May 2024, we learned that hybrid vehicles will not be available to us for this year.

Internally restricted fund – Significant amounts of reserve funds have been committed.

Capital Budget Carry Forward has a balance of \$111,119 as of December 31, 2023.
